Let Girls Be Born (LGBB) is an advocacy project through which Plan International (India Chapter) works to end discrimination and fight female foeticide through effective implementation of the law. SRKPS has implemented this project since 2011 in Jaipur, Rajasthan. To achieve the goal of the project various activities were carried out to indulge the community members such as newlyweds, adolescent girls and women, simultaneously advocacy with the implementing authorities and sensitization of service providers was also done.

The primary objective is to enable youth to realize their dreams by equipping them with market-led job oriented vocational training (JOVT) and essential life skills, which not only helps them to access decent employment but also makes them representatives of a gender just society. With collaboration of Deutsche Bank and Plan India the III Phase of SAKSHAM Project at Khatipura, Jaipur. The project offers three courses retail, BPO and Tally for GST.

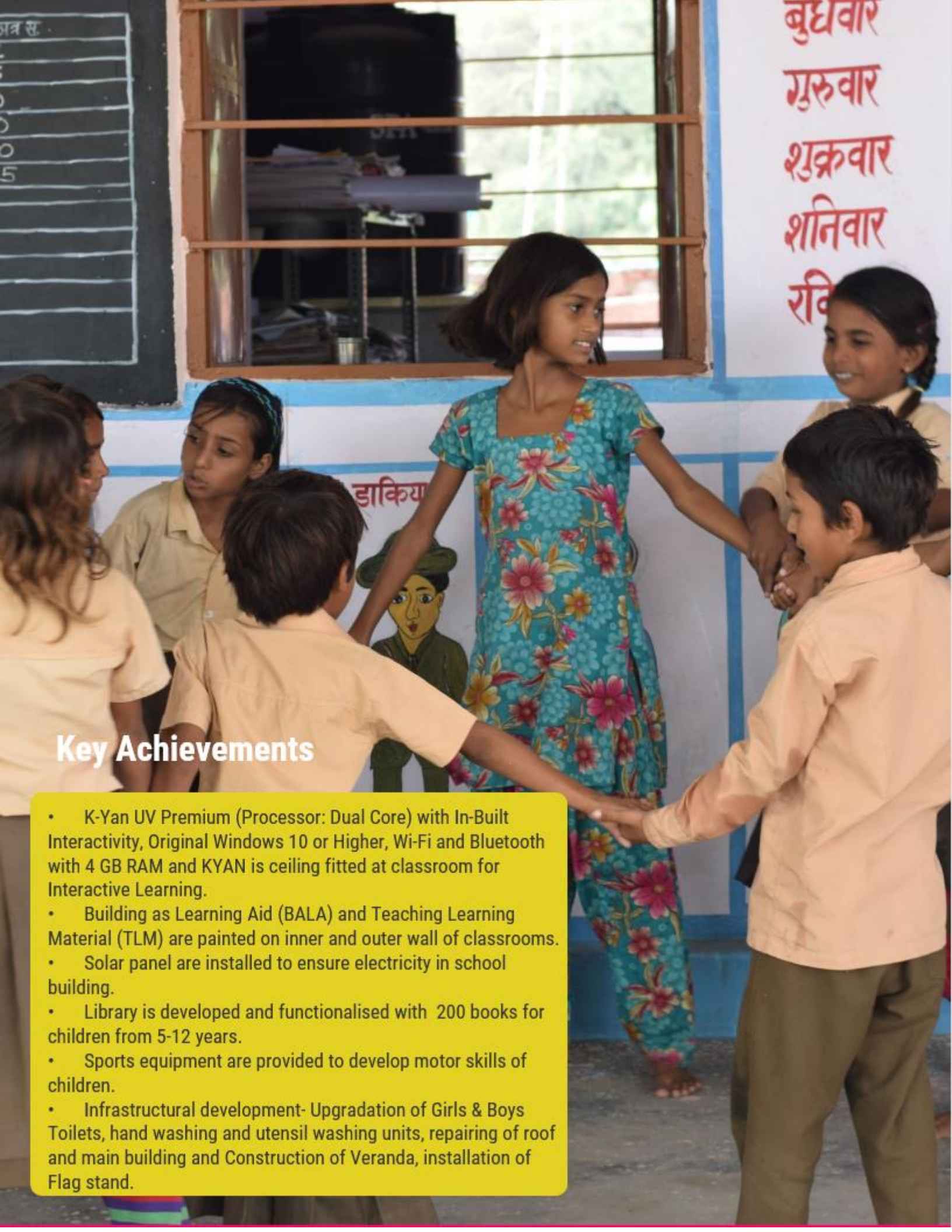

Model School

Improving quality of education by technology intervention and ensuing availability of WASH facilities for students.

“Empowering children through Model School project” was started with support from Plan India from July 2018 and will continue till June 2019. The project is being implemented in Government Primary School of Kacherwala in Chokhliyavaas village of Amber tehsil in Jaipur District. In this particular primary school there 23 girls and 14 boys (a total of 37) students in 1st to 5th standard





Key Achievements

- K-Yan UV Premium (Processor: Dual Core) with In-Built Interactivity, Original Windows 10 or Higher, Wi-Fi and Bluetooth with 4 GB RAM and KYAN is ceiling fitted at classroom for Interactive Learning.
- Building as Learning Aid (BALA) and Teaching Learning Material (TLM) are painted on inner and outer wall of classrooms.
- Solar panel are installed to ensure electricity in school building.
- Library is developed and functionalised with 200 books for children from 5-12 years.
- Sports equipment are provided to develop motor skills of children.
- Infrastructural development- Upgradation of Girls & Boys Toilets, hand washing and utensil washing units, repairing of roof and main building and Construction of Veranda, installation of Flag stand.

Safer Cities, Jaipur

A locally led, globally united initiative that contributes to develop safe, accountable, and inclusive cities with and for girls.

The project is a critical pivot to achieve a step-change improvement in safety for girls in cities and promoting gender equality. It is playing a decisive role in delivering transformative change in the lives of girls. organization intervened in two wards i.e. Ward Number 22 and 27 of Hasanpura Basti in Jaipur City.

During the course of a year the project has engaged with a range of stakeholders like girls, boys, parents and caregivers and local authorities (e.g., municipal authorities, public transport managers, police etc.) to confront social and cultural norms and unequal gender power relations which hinder girls' safety in cities. The program has created a core group of girls and boys who continue to participate in the program activities on a regular basis.



Key Achievements

- 308 boys and girls are trained as Champions of Change
- 37 NGOs members were sensitized to create a forum for Safer Jaipur
- 17043 parents, community members and government officials were directly reached to develop mechanism for safety in public places
- 124 transport officials and drivers sensitized to ensure safety in transit space
- 83 girls visited women safety mechanism institutes by government.



Tobacco Control

Advancing Comprehensive Tobacco control in Rajasthan through institutional development, capacity building and effective implementation of MPOWER measures

The project is funded by The International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease, Inc (The Union) and implemented by SRKPS. The project aims to make 13 districts of Rajasthan (Jaipur, Sikar, Dausa, Alwar, Kota, Bundi, Baran, Chittorgarh, Jodhpur, Pali, Jalore, Nagaur & Ajmer) compliant to India's tobacco control legislation (COTPA, 2003) through institutionalization, capacity building, implementation and enforcement. In addition the project is to support the state in developing comprehensive guidelines under FCTC 5.3 to counter tobacco industry interference. Project also aims to counter the newly emerging challenges to tobacco control like the such new products (ENDS, HNB Tobacco and others) and support the and district administration in introducing vendor licensing and its effective implementation throughout the state.

Strengthening Anganwadi Center

Holistic development of children, women and adolescent girls by building the knowledge and capacity to demand and access services

This project got implemented in at 30 Anganwadi Centers of of Nimbaheda Block of district Chittorgarh, Rajasthan under the joint ownership of NUVOCO Vistas Co.Ltd. and SRKPS. Main objectives of projects are Innovative education service for all round development of children 0-6 year as per National Early Child Care and Education (ECCE) policy, Strengthening VHSNC to ensure to ensure community participation in implementing monitoring and planning for health program activities at Anganwadi level, Improving the nutrition level of children and pregnant women by ensuring the effective implementation of services under NNM and POSHAN Abhiyaan.

CHILDLINE 1098

It is a 24-hour a day, 365 days a year, free, emergency phone service for children in need of aid and assistance

At CHILDLINE, we follow an action process which starts at the first call and continues till the child in need of care and protection is safely rehabilitated. And to achieve that we every call made by adult or a child is assured of assistance from a trained team incapacitated to reach the child within an hour of having received a call on 1098. Childline 1098, Jhunjhunu service was started in September, 2016 and within few months of its starting 1098 services reaches to every town and villages of the district.

After reaching the child it works with multiple stakeholders such as police authorities, child protection boards, social workers and counselors. Children's consent and participation is an important component of this process from response to intervention. o ensure the child's continued safety, CHILDLINE proceeds to find long-term rehabilitation for the child. For this, the CHILDLINE team does constant follow ups with the child – meeting the family or the visiting the shelter if a child has been assigned to stay in one.

Targeted Intervention

Targeted intervention as a strategy for prevention has proved to be an effective means to contain the prevalence of HIV in the state of Rajasthan.

Injection Drug Users (IDUs)

IDUs are a third HRG for which targeted interventions are of critical importance. HIV is highly transmissible through the sharing of needles and other injection equipment, so it can spread very rapidly within networks of IDUs who share injecting equipment with each other. Once HIV prevalence is high in the IDU population, it can expand quickly into their sexual networks. Some IDUs are also sex workers, which can quickly link HIV transmission in the IDU networks to transmission in the larger high-risk sexual networks.

With the financial support of RSACS (Rajasthan State AIDS Control Society), Jaipur, TI project, with a target of 400 IDUs (Injecting Drug Users), has been started from March 2011, in Kota district of Rajasthan. As part of targeted interventions, we focus on all the six components of TI:

- Provision of commodities
- Clinical services
- Enabling environment
- Behavioral Communication change
- Community Mobilization
- Referral and Linkages

The project has 645 registered IDUs.

Female Sex Workers (FSWs)

The program of targeted intervention project is in for achieving the goal of NACP basically for prevention of HIV/AIDS control. The core group under TI the first one is Female sex worker (FSW) then MSM and IDU HRGs and the bridge population like Migrant and Trucker are mainly exposed with FSW apart from this the general population are also exposed with FSW.

Bhawani Mandi is a famous for its railway station and a huge orange market, so in search of business, HRGs associated with it visits here. The orange business here takes place for 8 months. It is the area of big factories so people come from U.P, Bihar, M.P, Maharashtra, Nepal, etc to work. At least 8000 HRGs work in these factory.

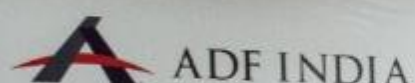
Effective Implementation of PCPNDT Act

Supporting State PCPNDT cell of Delhi & Rajasthan in addressing Gender Biased Sex Selection Practices

In past two decades sex ratio in northern India shown decline and this situation is result of misuse of technology to perform gender biased sex selection. Gender biased sex selection of fetus in India is illegal under the PC & PNDT Act, 1994. The project is funded by Alliance Defending Freedom and implemented by SRKPS. Major focus of this project is conducting decoy operations (stings) in Delhi & Rajasthan and provides support to respective State's PCPNDT cells in catching law violators red handed. Under the project it was ensured that a strong case was filled and this action will be supported by Vanishing Girls. .

Key Achievements

- Collaborated with state PCPNDT cell of Delhi and Rajasthan to identify the sex selection clinics.
- 13 centers identified as sex selection clinics.
- Capacity building workshop on eliminating and sex selection practices with State PCPNDT Cell Delhi was organised.

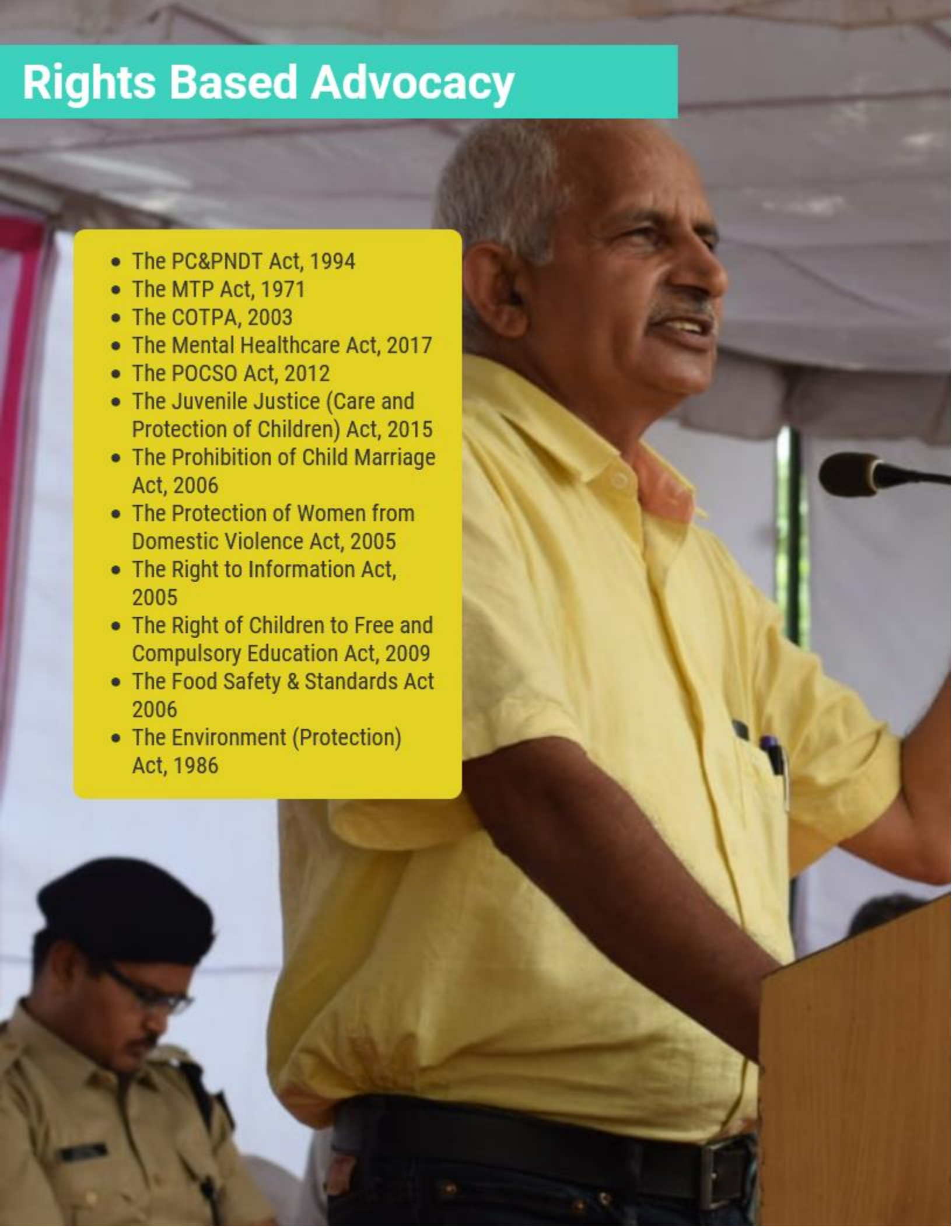

Addressing ASHA supervisors at the workshop, he said that in the current lifestyle tension and depression has increased among people due to which suicidal tendency is also increasing. In such situation, the role of ASHAs increases, as they work in urban and rural areas as bridge in carrying health services to people. Choudhary asked ASHA supervisors and

facilitators that if they find any person suffering from depression for quite a long time then should immediately refer to psychiatrist or experts at the nearby district hospital for necessary health services. He said treatment is provided free of cost under National Mental Health Programme. Public Health expert Bhupesh Dixit further explained about the symptoms of person with suicidal thoughts, methods of preven-

tion; and about the myths spreading in the society about suicides. He said more than 14 lakh people have killed themselves between 2006 and 2015 in India as per Accidental Deaths and Suicides in India (ADSI) report of National Crime Record Bureau (NCRB). In 2006, total 11,33,14 people killed themselves, while in 2015 this number increased to 13,96,23 - an increase of 17.3% and this number is maximum in south eastern Asian countries. Dixit said Rajasthan has no exception, in last 10 years from 2007 to 2017 total 48,000 people killed themselves including 34,249 males, 14,719 females and a transgender. "The main reasons of suicide are family problems/disputes; physical, mental and economic problems due to chronic illness; depression; financial breakdown; rift in marital relations and unemployment," he added.

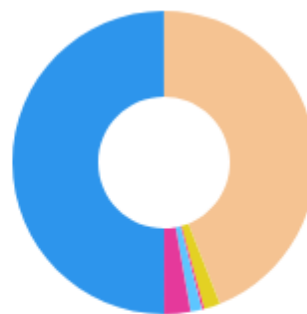
